Dear friends in Christ.

We have had to shift the ways we engage in ministry from a focus on in-person worship and meetings to livestream worship, virtual meetings and gatherings in the parking lot. We have had to shift to teaching children at home and working from home. We have not been able to travel to see friends or relatives or to celebrate life events. Minutes: Annual Congregational Meeting

January 26, 2020 | 9:30 am

Call to Order: Having established a quorum, President Katherine Halvorson called the meeting to order at 9:39 am.

Opening Devotions were given by Pastor Mary Suomala Folkerds.

Approval of the Agenda: Kevin Stenstrom made a motion to approve the agenda as written. Jim Lizakowski seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Approval of the Minutes of the last Annual Meeting on January 27, 2019: Paul Eidbo made a motion that was seconded by Emily Gess to approve the minutes of the last annual meeting held January 27, 2019. Minutes were approved.

Approval of Special Congregational Meeting Minutes: Colleen Hyde made a motion, seconded by Joan Engeseth, to approve the minutes of the following meetings:

- + Special Congregational Meeting held April 14, 2019, to elect a Call Committee
- + Special Congregational Meeting held December 8, 2019, to issue a contract to Rev. Daniel Forsberg to be Associate Pastor of Congregational Care.

Special meeting minutes were approved.

Report of the President: President Katherine Halvorson made brief comments reflecting on all we have to be thankful for in the past year. Katherine called for celebration of the staff changes and additions, use of the new Education Wing, our vibrant and growing ministry, new grant money for our mission work at Sanctuary, and the generosity of our members.

Reports of the Pastors: Pastor Mary expressed her excitement about our ministry and mission, and the service opportunities available for all ages in and outside our church building that are revealing God. She called our work "strength training for our faith". Pastor Mary specifically mentioned that having a full staff will allow for strengthening of our second site at Sanctuary Events Center and our visitation ministry. She closed her comments saying, "We are about Jesus and relationships here."

2019 Financial Report: Joe Braun highlighted some year-end details. We ended 2019 with an \$8,672 surplus, envelope giving decreased from 2018 (656 households gave), and the staff expenses came in under budget again.

Presentation and Adoption of the 2020 Budget: Joe Braun presented the 2020 Budget. The proposed budget is a 9% increase over the 2019 budget (after the Ministry Initiative Fund). Joe anticipates a need for an extra push for giving in 2021 due to the loss of the Ministry Initiative Fund and a full staff. Emily Gess made a motion to adopt the 2020 Budget. The motion was seconded by Jerry Bjelde. The 2020 Budget was approved.

Elections: Joan Engeseth, President-elect, presented a ballot of nominees for Council and Non-Council positions. Clarifying point: Joe Sumers previously agreed to serve a 3-year term on the Trust Fund Committee, but his name was inadvertently left off the ballot. Hearing no other additions to the ballot, President Katherine Halvorson called for the vote. The ballots were collected. The ballot as presented was approved.

Adjournment: There being no other business, Joe Halvorson made a motion, seconded by Nicole Swanson, to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried and the meeting closed at 10:17 am with the Lord's Prayer.

Motion made by Mike Drewelow and seconded by Joe Braun to adjourn at 9:38 a.m.


The **meeting closed** at 9:38 am with the Lord's Prayer.

Pastor's Report: Rev. Mary Suomala **Folkerds**

Lead Pastor



At the beginning of 2020, I was confident in the ministry plan for the upcoming year. I was excited for the staff team that we had put together (both the new additions and the more seasoned members). Everyone had the right gifts to minister to the congregation AND reach out to the community.

And then March came...

What I learned (and continue to learn) is that God provides. We have the right mix of technology-savvy and relationship-focused staff members and volunteers. At the heart of the game plan, we have our mission— Gather, Grow, and Go so that ALL may know Jesus.

We also had the right attitude. Instead of focusing on what we couldn't do, we focused on what we could do. We used tried-and-true means of connecting like phone calls, notes, outdoor worship services, and weekly one-onone Communion (Curbside Communion). We used new methods of connecting including small groups via Zoom and online worship. What helped as we experimented with how to be about our mission was having the trust of our church family. I know it hasn't been easy, but I have felt graciousness and a willingness to hang together throughout this time.

VUCA Volatile Uncertain Complex Ambiguous

Early in the pandemic, I heard a military acronym, VUCA, that has been helpful to me. In times of VUCA, it is crucial to stay focused on your mission! Our mission is stated well in our Church Constitution where it recognizes Jesus as the

head of our church family and states that our purpose is to: "Carry out Christ's Great Commission by reaching out to all people, to bring them to faith in Christ, and doing all ministry with a global awareness consistent with the understanding of God as Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier of all." (C4.02.c)

My hopes for 2021:

- 1. In-person Worship: Being back in-person once enough vaccines are in the community. It will be different—impacted and informed by everything we have learned in 2020, and something we don't take for granted.
- 2. **BeFrienders:** Expand our caring ministry including more BeFrienders trained by Pastor Dan to equip congregation members to care for one another.
- **3. Church Outreach:** Be the Church outside the walls of the building through Curbside Communion and ministry in Downtown Fargo with Pastor Taylor.
- 4. Kids & Families: Meeting the needs of our youth with Deacon Julie and Youth Director Diana, and continuing to partner with the YMCA for community childcare needs.
- 5. Mission Partners: Encourage more of us as a congregation to care for our neighbors near and far. Locally, we have committed money to help Churches United for the Homeless with their building campaign, and globally, we have committed money to the India-Nepal water project through Lutheran World Relief.

There have been hard losses this past year and there has been hard-won growth, as well. Thank you for being part of this church family and for taking these steps of faith with us!

Pastor's Report: Rev. Taylor Wilson

Pastor of Mission Development



As Pastor of Mission Development at Good Shepherd, part of my role is continuing to discern ways to make faith accessible to our members and broader communities. With Downtown Fargo being one of the intentional outlets for evangelism, discipleship, and creativity, I entered 2020 with excitement. We had an

amazing Christmas Eve downtown, a solid start to the year in attendance during the first few months of the year, and excitement as I met with our lay leadership team to create a plan to make our Fargo Easter services a key part of the community and growth that would draw in guests and take a step toward sustainability. The postcards were ordered, the schedule was set, and I began to dream about what could be.

In the first week of March, I attended the Exponential



Conference in Orlando with other ELCA colleagues from the Synod. The conference drew in attendance from thousands of people from around the world interested in Evangelism, Discipleship, and Church Planting. Who knew one week later that the idea of thousands of people from around the world entering a place like Orlando would be classified as a hot spot and a terrifying thought!

We soon pivoted from in-person to online, which we've continued since mid-March. I had restructured the rental agreement in January 2020 to month-to-month from a one or two-year agreement, allowing us to put a pause on our financial commitment to a place we weren't using to gather the church community. We also opted to record worship out of one location to be good stewards of time and health for our volunteers and staff, shifting mainly to Moorhead. We also held special recording sessions at Rustic Oaks, Drekker, Twenty Below Coffee Company, Sanctuary Events Center, and outdoor events at Oak Grove Lutheran School in Fargo.

As I look forward to the 2021 ministry year, our plan is to continue to pause weekly Sunday morning services at Sanctuary Events Center. Once our leadership deems it safe, we're considering pivoting to a one-time-permonth afternoon/evening time of worship at Sanctuary Events Center, with opportunities for small groups, service opportunities, and fellowship taking place at local businesses and organizations afterward. We were granted an additional \$10,000 from the ELCA to pursue creative ways to be the church in outside-the-box ways, which we're doing through this pivot, as well as our new podcast, Life in FM, where we continue to share sermons and conversations related to faith and life in our community.



Pastor's Report: Rev. Dan Forsberg

Pastor of Congregational Care

"The friend who can be silent with us in a moment of despair or confusion, who can stay with us in an hour of grief and bereavement, who can tolerate not knowing, not curing, not healing, and face with us the reality of our

powerlessness, that is the friend who cares." (Henri Nouwen)

Henry Nouwen's quote captures the spirit and heart of the BeFriender Ministry that began in the throes of COVID-19. There couldn't have been a better or more important time for us to begin this journey together. BeFriender Ministry is a listening presence of lay ministers who represent their faith community adhering to four foundational principles:

- 1. God is present in every encounter
- 2. Caring, not curing
- 3. Non-judgmental presence
- 4. Active listening

In April, five members of Good Shepherd were trained via Zoom by the National Director of BeFrienders Ministry, Barb Schwery. This group became the Leadership Team:

- + **Trainer:** Mark Rice
- + Facilitators: Dorothy Suomala and Rod Engeseth
- + Administrator: Joan Engeseth
- + **Program Supervisor:** Pastor Dan Forsberg

In September, the Leadership Team trained and commissioned six new members—Galen Clow, Kari Jo Hanson, Armin Pipho, Doug Schindler, Victor Teigen, and Beth VanderLinden. We have seven additional members of Good Shepherd who will be trained in early 2021.



Our BeFriender Team meets once a month via ZOOM for ongoing support. Currently, our team is committed to connecting with others by phone. Our goal is to expand this ministry to help meet the various needs of members here at Good Shepherd.

Pastor Mary and I have connected with Lutheran Social Services (LSS) of Minnesota in a new program, Community Care Corps. This is a volunteer model that pairs LSS expertise with local congregations to educate, train, and empower volunteers to provide high quality, non-medical support for older adults, people with disabilities, and family caregivers. Volunteer services will include direct, in-home support and the use of technology to connect isolated individuals/families to the community. Good Shepherd will be given eight iPads for members to use as a tool for overcoming isolation and connecting caregivers to their faith communities.

gsChildren & Family



gsChildren & Family: Deacon Julie Wilson

Children & Family Ministry Director
At best, a youth leader will have 40 hours with a kid or teenager in a given year. That same kid will have 3,000 hours with a parent or caregiver. We know that what happens at home matters more than what happens at

church. But for parents, 2020 delivered a one-two punch: Work from home. Wear masks. Reduce your social circle. And, have so much time at home. Parents have found themselves worn down and worried. Our faith can help us in times like these. We can do hard things. And we can trust that God is in the midst of whatever you are facing. Faith Formation with kids ages 3-Grade 5 has shifted this year.

VBS@Home: Think Vacation Bible School (VBS) meets HelloFresh—128 children received a customized VBS box with all of their supplies for daily lessons, crafts, STEM skills, and service projects.

Congregation Engagement Director



The year 2020 was quite the year! As Pastor Mary emphasized throughout 2020, instead of staff concentrating on those things that we weren't able to do, we concentrated on all the things we could accomplish.

Staff shifted into new roles and worked well as a team to ensure relationships continued and grew

leaps and bounds! Highlights from 2020:

- + **Feed My Starving Children:** In February, Good Shepherd volunteers packed food for the event, and fed the Feed My Starving Children staff.
- + **Life After Fifty:** Monthly, through March, the group enjoyed a time of fellowship with a speaker, food, and games.
- + **Weddings:** Ceremonies were smaller or moved outside to the east lawn—a few afternoons looked a little "iffy," but we only had one rainout!



- + **Baptisms:** We baptized at small ceremonies in the church, on the lawn, and at the lake.
- + Blood Drives: In March and September, we hosted blood drives through the American Red Cross to give back to our community.
- + Sandwich Making: 20+ crews worked in the church kitchen making sandwiches for Churches United serving homeless members of our community.
- + YMCA Childcare: This September–December we hosted the YMCA, allowing us to minister to students in our community.





- + **New Member Connections:** Gatherings moved online via Zoom!
- + Ruby's Pop-Up Pantry: In November, we began hosting Ruby's Pop-Up Pantry. Monthly, we distribute food to anyone looking to extend their monthly grocery budget. Volunteers unloaded the food, sorted food and boxed it up in food bundles, loaded cars and directed traffic, and brought leftovers to local food pantries. We plan to continue this outreach ministry in 2021!
- + **gsConnect Small Groups:** Church is not closed—we just moved online!

We were made for relationships. Much of what we're to gain, learn and experience from healthy relationships is a reflection of the kind of connection God wants to have with us—and others. He shows us glimpses of himself through some of the people He puts in our lives. The year 2020 was a perfect example of what it meant to connect with people in new ways. God walked beside us in 2020 and will continue to guide us in 2021!

gsEngagement: Helping Hands

A ministry of servant leaders

The Helping Hands had their most successful Pancake Feed in January--thanks to our church family and the many community members who participated.

Our group met until COVID-19 hit; however, ministry still happened but in different ways. Ministries supported by Helping Hands in 2020: Good Shepherd Youth, parking lot maintenance (including repainting lines), radio



broadcasts, coffee fund, Good Shepherd "Laugh. Pray. Serve." Group, food security for community members, lawn care through FM Properties, planting new trees, and a Lake Agassiz Habitat for Humanity Build.

In addition to taking care of our beautiful grounds (lawn mowing and snow removal teams), the group has helped with several projects throughout the year.

We were also saddened by the loss of our departed brothers in Christ—Earl Lee, Gordy Rustad, Grant Haug, Earl Stein, Sid Engelstad, and Bill DesSaint. You have made an impact on us all and have been amazing role models.

We are looking forward to what God has in store for us in the coming year.

The women of Good Shepherd met for Circle gatherings through the month of February. Concentrating on what we could do rather than what we weren't

able to do, gatherings occurred in smaller groups during the year. A big thank you to Dorothy Suomala who prepared monthly Bible study discussions, so that our women were able to continue being in God's Word. Many stories were shared with me on how ladies looked forward to Bible study and fellowship!

Gather, the magazine of Women of the ELCA, offers a mix of articles, theological reflections. devotions and stories of comfort and challenge that help readers grow in faith and engage in



ministry and action. Gather is published 10 times a year with combined issues in January/February and July/ August. A print subscription is \$19.95 a year. Digital access (computer, iPad, Android) is free to print for subscribers. For more information, or to subscribe by phone, call 844,409,0576.

Our Good Shepherd quilters were still busy throughout the year. Many quilt tops were created and sewn in homes. A small group of quilters met twice a week with five or less at each gathering. Even though we were unable to send quilts in May and October, the ladies were able to share many of their guilts with those in our own community.

Northwestern Minnesota Synod Report: Bishop Bill Tesch

Dear Beloved in Christ of the Northwestern Minnesota Synod,

I am writing in the final days of 2020, a year we will be happy to put behind us! In Luke 2, old Simeon meets the baby Jesus and praises God, because in this child the long era of Israel's oppression was behind them and a new era of salvation was dawning. Yet the baby Jesus was, like all babies, all promise and no product. Simeon may have died a satisfied man, but had he lived 33 more years, he would have seen Jesus fulfill some promises... and leave others yet to be fulfilled. Now we live in "the time between." This is the time between the revelation of Emmanuel, God with us in all of life, and the time when Jesus "will come again to judge the living and the dead," bringing justice and healing to all. In this time, we walk with the faith of Simeon, thanking God for the salvation we have seen and trusting God for the salvation yet to come. Our Gospel work is also shaped by the "in-between-ness" of these times. We are reassured by the countless ways that God has been faithful to us and to our church in the past, even while we trust that God will continue to show up for us in the daunting challenges we face in the future.

Please take a look at the enclosed/attached document which describes just some of the work we've been about as your synod staff this last year. This list is by no means comprehensive (that would be long, and possibly boring!). It's just the result of some brainstorming at one staff meeting last fall.

Since the start of the pandemic, I've understood our work to be keeping people connected, encouraged, informed and resourced. This has involved weekly and now semi-monthly virtual gatherings with rostered leaders, weekly and now monthly virtual meetings with congregation presidents, along with what has now become a vast collection of resources for church leadership in time of pandemic, COVID safety resources, virtual ministry resources, online worship services, etc.

This last year we've also been hard at work on our new strategic plan for the NW MN Synod. The plan flows from our vision: a people set free by the Gospel to be wholly devoted to Jesus and our neighbor in love. It is guided by our mission to foster safe and healthy places for the ministry of the Gospel to unfold and to shape an abundant future for all. It will focus on four lines of effort: vital small-membership congregations, leadership development, striving for justice and peace and responding to emerging change. Watch for more information on the strategic plan early this year.

Dear ones, thank you for your faithfulness in the Gospel! When the pandemic hit, you quickly adapted and found ways to share the good news in changed and challenging circumstances. Thanks also for your generosity that makes ministry happen, not only there in your congregation, but through your Mission Support, all across NWMN and around the world! Good work. 
